

#### 4. No.3 SUNNYSIDE

The next stop on your Titanic Trail around the Town is the cottage where William Murdoch was born at 3 Sunnyside. Pass in front of the school to your right and take the road on your left down the side of the school.



This takes you over a little Bridge over Dalbeattie Burn. Facing you at the end of the Road is No.3 Sunnyside. Turn left into.....

#### 5. BARRHILL ROAD to COLLISTON PARK

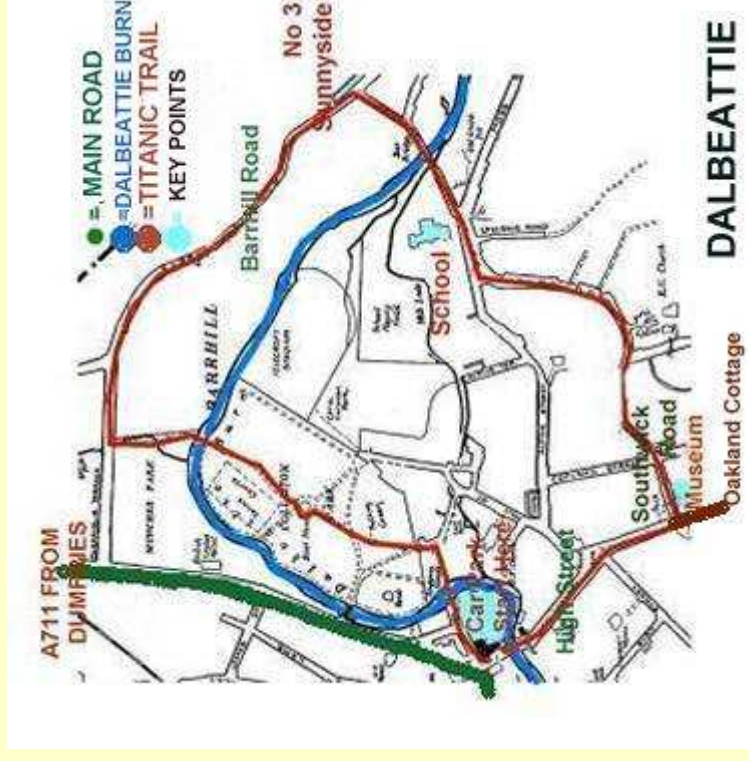
As you meander down the road enjoy the lovely views across to Rounall Woods. On the left after the houses take the pathway beside Munches Park Home. This leads to Colliston Park where you can picnic or play putting or hire a paddle boat. . Leave the park by the footbridge back to the carpark.

#### 6. MEMORIAL WALL PLAQUE

From the Car Park return to the High Street and see the Memorial Plaque embedded in the wall of the Town Hall beside the entrance.

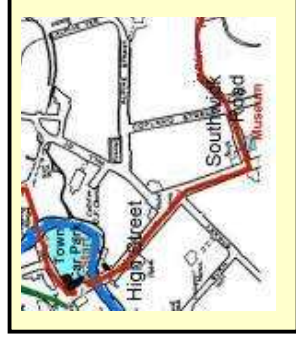
## FOLLOW IN FIRST LT. MURDOCH'S FOOTSTEPS

### 1. THE MUSEUM STOP

From the Car Park at the entrance to the Town, take the pathway to The High Street beside the Dalbeattie Burn. Walk along the High Street till Southwick Road on the left. There you will find the Museum, open from 11am till 4pm, April till September. There is a Titanic Display and knowledgeable staff to tell you the history and the connection with Dalbeattie.



### 2. OAKLAND COTTAGE

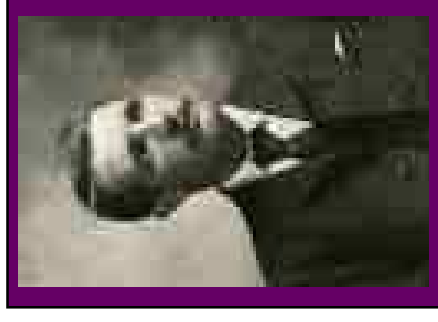
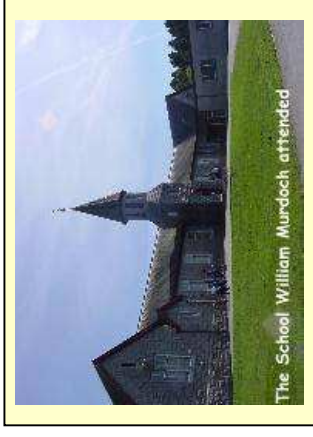
After visiting the Museum carry on along the High Street a short way to Oakland Cottage where First Lt. Wm. Murdoch lived before he went to sea.

### 3. THE SCHOOL

Once you have found Oakland Cottage and taken a photograph, walk back to Southwick Road past the Museum and up the hill to the top of Southwick Road where you will see the school Lt. Murdoch attended. It is now a Primary School but in William Murdoch's time it was the Primary and the Secondary School combined. See the weather vane with the holes in it said to have been made by shotgun pellets. Ask the Museum staff about this too!

Although William Murdoch and his family lived in various parts of Dalbeattie, many of the menfolk went to sea. One son always stayed at home, however, his job being to work 'on land', look after the family, and ensure the next generation.
